#### **Two New Clinics!**

This past year has been a year of growth for Kateri Medical Services. In April, we dedicated our third medical facility - The Arthur And Esther Bradley Memorial Anglican Hospital in Gidan Waya. After the dedication service, we held our first free medical outreach, during which Graceland Hospital is located adjacent to Graceland Inwe helped about 1,700 people with medical care. In October, we dedicated our fourth medical facility -Graceland Hospital in Gusau. Graceland Hospital is our largest facility to date. This larger building was made possible by the heroic efforts of fundraising by the Anglican Diocese of Gusau, a very generous donor from Ohio and Kateri Medical Services.

After dedicating the new hospital, we held our first free medical out-reach, during which we helped 1,600 people with medical care, including about 40 surgeries. We are now interviewing and hiring permanent staff and will run the hospital full-time as soon as staff are in place.

## One Woman's Story

Here is the real story of one of people our clinics have In 2018, we conducted one-week free medical outreach-

"Mama is an illiterate, about-70year-old Muslim Fulani woman, who is a widow and lives in some distant village from the who, until recently, wasn't regular with her meds."

"She had been depressed for a while now owing to the fact that some months ago, she had narrated to me that her husband and children had been killed by

cattle rustlers who stormed their abode to rob them of their properties that included their herd of cattle. She hasn't been the same afterwards."

"She recently presented to the facility, after a prolonged period of absence and, obviously, irregularity with her meds, with an offensive putrefying smell while being bedridden. She had earlier felt a sting on her leg one afternoon while she aleaned for firewood in her farm and scratched off the area, assuming it was just another itch. Days to weeks later, her left foot from the outside of the dorsum extending to the ankle had an ulcer that was discharging copiously of odoriferous pus. The effluvium charged the surrounding air so much so that I had to wear a face mask.

"On examination we noticed that the pus had traveled and damaged underlying tissues well up until the mid -shin of the left leq. We made out to debride and irrigate the wound; it confirmed the extent of the damage.

"Working with a diagnosis of an arterial ulcer, we initially thought to refer her (to a city hospital) but she and her caregivers pleaded against it. They argued that if we insisted, they would rather go home and continue the native method of traditional medicine which had already proven useless before she came to the clinic. We explained the gravity of the situation but they would have none of it, so we decided to continue treating her at the clinic.

"Well, here we are, I am glad we did. After some weeks in the hospital and more weeks as an outpatient, mama is once again bouncing with the leg and making cases for little children in her community who are sick and wouldn't be brought to the clinic, serving as their advocate.


